BGUMC Lent/Easter Mission Project Raise Some Dough? Can Do!




During Lent and Easter,

I was recently reminded of my connection to the first Psalm that I had ever memorized. It was on the occasion of my confirmation, many years ago, that I embarked on a journey to commit this thing to memory. I did it so that I could stand before the congregation in Danube, MN, and share with them what I had learned. For this letter, I am sharing the Psalm from the New International Version.

Psalm 23: 1-6 ¹ The Lord is my shepherd, I lack nothing. ² He makes me lie down in green pastures, he leads me beside quiet waters, he refreshes my soul. He guides me along the right paths for his name's sake. ⁴ Even though I walk through the darkest valley, I will fear no evil, for you are with me; your rod and your staff, they comfort me. ⁵ You prepare a table before me in the presence of my enemies. You anoint my head with oil; my cup overflows. ⁶ Surely your goodness and love will follow me all the days of my life, and I will dwell in the house of the Lord forever.

I was reminded of my boyhood connection to this Psalm this past weekend. It came to me as I was preparing for a young man's funeral service. Amidst my preparation, prayers and ponderings on what I was going to offer during the service, this Psalm rang out in my heart. How many of us have been in the midst of life when we have been struck by such awesome words like the beauty found in this Psalm? How many of us have allowed those words to dance around in our hearts for a while as we savored their meaning? Friends, I can tell you that I allowed this Psalm to reconnect me to my boyhood, my faith, my church and my Savior Jesus. Some say that the 23rd Psalm is the most popular psalm. I think it is popular because of the comfort that is offered. I know that I thank God for my childhood pastor's encouragement of me early on in my faith journey, to commit God's word to my memory. This Psalm has been one that has stuck with me and has provided for me in a variety of ways.

I know that many of you who have heard this Psalm once or twice before, and that you are probably aware of how it intentionally points us to Jesus. How it shows Jesus being the Good Shepherd and how He is the one who walked among us as fully God and fully human long ago. And how Jesus is available to us in our times of joy and times of need. You may be a person who finds peace in this Psalm because of its emphasis on Jesus. How it describes eloquently that He alone is the source of all comfort and peace. And that He is the one who "leads me beside quiet waters" and who "restores my soul" (vv. 2–3). I believe the Holy Spirit allowed this Psalm to minister to the people who were present for that young man's funeral. I also know that the Holy Spirit has used this Psalm for me this past Easter season, to give me a richer experience of Jesus' love for me and the world.

Many of us have the sights, sounds, joys, excitement, and leftovers in the refrigerator, to remind us of the amazing Easter Season that we just experienced together. As a group of faithful followers of Jesus, we remembered together Jesus' actions on Maundy Thursday and his institution of the Lord's Supper. We have the visual images of Good Friday etched in our memories. The day that Jesus allowed himself to be hung on a cross for our soul's sake. Then we have Jesus' words and actions forever embedded in our hearts as captured by the gospel of John, ""It is finished!" Then he bowed his head and released his spirit." (John 19:30). But we also had the joy of Sunday morning, oh Sunday morning! What a glorious day it was when Jesus did what he said he was going to do. My Lord, what a morning when he rose up from the grave. Wouldn't it be great if we could somehow find a way to be reminded of the joy of Easter and take it with us everywhere?

I have something for you to consider. Would you consider reading through the gospels and selecting a segment of the Easter story that brings joy to your heart? Then would you consider memorizing that segment? You decide how many verses you would like to store in your memory to rely on in the future. You select the parts of Jesus' actions that you want to be reminded of during those unexpected moments in your day. For me, I am working on Matthew 28, the whole chapter. I know it will take patience. I know it will take time. I also know, that each time I work on memorizing scripture, I am filled with joy again and again. Would you join me in thanking Jesus for all he has done for us? Thank you Jesus.

We have been delighted to share community and fellowship through rehearsals and performances of the Holy Week Combined Choir. 15 people from BGUMC and Waterville EUMC



Church Council Meeting Minutes

Blooming Grove UMC Council Meeting February 6, 2018

Members Present: Hjordi Churchill, Brain & Carolyn Kanne, Judy Mahler, Cindy Saufferer, Brad & Tracie Spinler, Dave & Sheryl Brisel, Marlis Mahler, Char Frankenberry, Pastor J.J. Morgan, Pastor Stefanie Morgan.

Chair Hjordi welcomed the Council and opened the meeting with a reading by Harriet Jane Olsen, General Secretary of the UMW on the topic "Many of us together – doing things we never dreamed of".

Minutes from November 7th were reviewed and approved.

Updates – Life of the Church

- Operation Christmas Child Many shoe boxes, filled with gifts, were collected and delivered.
- Sunday School Christmas Program a wonderful celebration. 35 children/youth/adults participated in the photo shoot in November with 80+ children, parents, grandparents, friends and neighbors attending the December program.
- Fall/Christmas BGUMC Disaster Relief Mission Outreach offering totaled \$2,400.
- Christmas Adopt-A-Family the generosity of BGUMC helped a family have a wonderful Christmas.
- BGUMC again donated to Emma's Place (Maplewood, MN) with Christmas Cub Food Gifts
- Community Outreach for Super Bowl The BGUMC confirmation class coordinated an outreach event to Hope Community Church in Minneapolis in which they helped "transform" rooms into a safe place for women who are victims of human trafficking during the Super Bowl. In addition, 30 dozen egg bake muffins were provided by generous BG people to feed women staying at Hope Community Church. That's a lot of eggs!
- January Leadership Retreat –Several BGUMC members attended a leadership retreat hosted by Pastors Stephanie and JJ. A day of good conversation, reflection, and fellowship.

BGUMC Guiding Principles

Hjordi led us in a review of our *BGUMC Guiding Principles*— copies were provided for all in attendance and extras placed in the back of the sanctuary. They are also available for viewing on our BG website. Hjordi asked for everyone to spend some time between now and our next Council meeting thinking about our Guiding Principles in the context of . . . "How are they still relevant?" and "How do we continue to 'put hands and feet' to them?"

Lent and Easter Special Offering

The Council agreed unanimously that the BGUMC special offering for Lent/Easter will be donated to the Steele and Waseca County Food Shelves. Minnesota Food Share matches all monetary donations made to the food shelves during March – so it's a great month to give. The monetary gifts need to be to the food shelf no later than April 8, 2018 for the matching funds to apply.

Pentecost Special Offering

The Council agreed that our BGUMC special offering for the Pentecost Season (to be kicked off on Pentecost Sunday) will be for continued hurricane relief for Puerto Rico. Judy will look for the corresponding number of the UMCOR disaster relief fund.

<u>Mission Opportunity – Henderson Settlement</u> Mission Trip

Cindy Saufferer mentioned the opportunity to take part in the Henderson Settlement Mission Trip sponsored by the Minnesota United Methodist Conference. The Henderson Settlement in Frakes, Kentucky, is home to 23,000 people who live in extreme poverty. The trip is all about service to these folks. Registration deadline: March 30, 2018. Details available on at minnesotaumc.org.

Commission on the Way Forward

Cindy Saufferer provided an excellent overview and update (verbal and handout) on the Commission on the Way Forward.

- The 2016 General Conference authorized the Council of Bishops to form the commission after decades of intensifying debate around inclusion of LGBTQ individuals. The commission has the task of advising the bishops on possible ways to clarify our thinking on what holds us together as a church and possible ways through the impasse. In turn the bishops will use that advice in determining what it submits to a Special General Conference in February 2019.
- Through the National UMW, Cindy has also been learning more about how congregations can host

conversations about this topic so that all are well informed and have an opportunity to provide insight. At a future meeting, we will consider the possibility of BGUMC hosting a "conversation/listening" event for UMCs in our area.

Committee Updates

Hjordi provided the 2018 Officer/Team/Committee list to all in attendance.

PPRC

The PPRC will discuss Safe Sanctuaries and bring information to the next meeting.

JJ and Stefanie both received Scholarships for Clergy Leadership Academy Wesley Pilgrimage in England (a requirement for the ordination process). The WV/BG sponsorship portion of the trip's cost will be reduced by the amount of both scholarships.

Trustees

The MN Department of Health recently checked the quality of our water. Some minor adjustments are needed with regard to how our water softener drains. The Trustees continue to consider options to make BGUMC handicap accessible (i.e. new entrance with elevator or an addition to the church with new fellowship hall, kitchen, and bathrooms). Progress has been made and Brad Spinler will be meeting with a draftsman to review different options. A full report will be provided to the Council before decisions are made.

UMW

- March UMW meeting will be at Faye Kanne's.
 Easter breakfast plans are underway.
- Cindy Saufferer and her three daughters will be attending UMW National Assembly in Columbus, OH this spring.
- Cindy is also travelling to Washington DC to participate in the Rally to End Racism, April 3-5.


